

Tom Keating selected as IHSAA's 6th executive director

BOONE, Iowa – On March 13, the Board of Control of the Iowa High School Athletic Association has selected Tom Keating to serve as its next executive director, starting July 1, 2019.

Keating is currently the president at Xavier, Cedar Rapids and will be the sixth executive director in IHSAA history. He will replace outgoing executive director Alan Beste, who announced his retirement in August.

"We're thrilled to welcome Tom Keating to the IHSAA family," Board of Control chairperson and Humboldt superintendent Greg Darling said. "The board went through an extensive hiring process with a national search, surveys to schools and staff, and rigorous interviews.

"Tom has taken a championship work ethic from his coaching career and combined that with invaluable knowledge as an educator and administrator. His exceptional core beliefs align with our vision of the IHSAA."

A native of Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, Keating began his career as a teacher and coach at Maxwell High School in 1977 before starting an award-winning run as a teacher, coach, and activities director at Wahlert, Dubuque in 1980. Wahlert won 11 state volleyball championships with Keating as head coach, and he was named NFHS National Coach of the Year for volleyball in 2003.

He moved to Xavier as principal in 2004 and was named the National Catholic Educational Association's Educator of the Year in 2010. Keating became president at Xavier in 2018.

"I am excited to join the IHSAA as its next executive director," Keating said.


"The IHSAA's long-standing tradition of serving its member schools in support of education-based activities is recognized locally and nationally. Working with an outstanding staff and board, as well as dedicated administrators and coaches across the state, it will be my goal to enhance the already outstanding programs offered at the IHSAA."

A longtime advisory committee member for the Iowa Girls High School Athletic Union, Keating served on the IHSAA's Board of Control from 2008-18 and was chairperson in 2014-15.

Keating was a 2003 inductee to the National High School Athletic Coaches Association's Hall of Fame. He has been an adjunct instructor and authored five graduate-level courses for Drake University.

"I look forward to working with the IGHSAU, IHSMA, IHS-SA, Iowa Hall of Pride, the Department of Education, and our state legislators to continue to find ways to positively impact young people in our state," Keating said.

The IHSAA is a non-profit organization providing leadership, regulation, and support to member schools and student-athletes for interscholastic sports across the state of Iowa.





The game plan

Just how much does character count?

Given the IHSAA's affiliation with schools, students, communities, officials, and leadership groups, one might ask, "What is at the core of the IHSAA's belief system when it comes to character and the 'Character Counts' program?"

According best-selling author and speaker Jon Gordon: "If you asked 100 people how important character is to build a great team, I bet at least 95 would say it's essential. After all, you can be the greatest leader or coach on the planet but if your team lacks character you will fail to reach your potential."

Not surprising, and yet, as much as it gets talked about, written about, and analyzed, what is the real impact of character on an organization, school, or team?

So often, leaders and coaches attempt to build a team or organization by focusing on talent rather than character and it leads to trouble. We see the effects of this decision-making flaw all the time in business and sports. Talent without a good moral compass or intuition creates undesirable issues for the entire team or organization.

Embedded within quality of good character is a desire to do what is right and not compromise the integrity of the team or organization. Too often, organizational struggles are created by divisiveness over who is right and focus is lost on egos and personalities. If character really counts, then it should supercede the politics, the powerplays, the personal motivations, and allow for the truth to prevail — yielding the outcome of what is right.

Character cultivates talent and moves an organization or team from average to greatness. A leader that is humble, hard-working, honest, decisive, dedicated, selfless, loyal, and accountable will be the kind of person who develops the organizational talent and makes the right decisions to benefit the team.

Character education doesn't begin nor end with initiatives in schools or businesses. All of the seminars, retreats, and conferences in the world will not invoke a difference in organizational or team culture unless the leadership and talent are grounded in the components of solid character. It is obvious that character education is something we can all use. But without practical application on a daily basis, it is useless.

As a service organization to our member schools, it is our hope that good character is what we stand for and also what we expect of the schools, communities, and officials we serve.

Ankeny claims first swimming championship in second year at CRWC

IOWA CITY, Iowa – The second year of the IHSAA State Swimming Championships at the University of Iowa's Campus Recreation and Wellness Center produced more record times and, most importantly for a storied program, the first team championship for Ankeny back in February.

The drama of the 2018 meet's finish was capped in 2019 by the co-op of Ankeny and Ankeny Centennial, with coach Justin Crouch's squad being led by sophomore Trent Frandson to a trophy over runner-up Waukee, third-place Bettendorf, and Dowling Catholic in fourth.

Frandson won the 200-yard freestyle in the day's second event and came back to shatter a state record in the 500 freestyle, holding off Cedar Falls' two-time defending champ Dylan Moffatt and racing to the finish in 4:23.46, more than four seconds better than the record Moffatt set in 2018. Ankeny also finished in second-place two times and third once in the meet's relay events, claiming team points and climbing the podium enough times to win the single-class trophy.

Bunn leads Bettendorf to trophy

Bettendorf junior Charlie Bunn rode back home with four gold medals and two individual Automatic All-American marks after an impressive freestyle outing at the state meet.

Bunn first raced to solo wins in the 50 and 100 freestyle events, going 20.42 and 44.94 to clearly tap the wall ahead of his competitors.

After smiling on his exit from the pool and quickly toweeling off, Bunn got back on deck to anchor the 200 and 400 freestyle relays for the Bulldogs. Bettendorf claimed Automatic All-American times in those wins too, leading with Andrew Ottavianelli, Luke Nickles, and Sam Mitvalsky in the 200 and Ottavianelli, Nickles, and freshman Alex Stone in the 400. Bunn was sensational in the anchor legs, going 50 yards in 19.76 seconds in the 200 relay, then following that with a 44.38 closing run in the 400 relay.

Dowling Catholic opens with record relay

The packed crowd inside CRWC was anticipating record times in the exceptionally fast and clean college facility, and Dowling Catholic, West Des Moines didn't

make them wait long. The Maroons reeled off a state meet record and Automatic All-American time in the day's first event, going 1:32.67 in the 200 medley relay. The quartet of Nick Chase, Jerry Xu, Gage Agnew, and John Culver secured 40 points for their team efforts and finished two seconds ahead of second-place Iowa City, West.


Chase followed that up with an individual win in the 100 backstroke later in the day, finishing in 50.10.

Frandsen, Frazier impress

Iowa City, City High's Forrest Frazier emphatically earned state swimmer of the year honors in 2018 after taking the 100 butterfly and 100 breaststroke titles as a sophomore. Back in his hometown pool this February, Frazier focused individually on the breaststroke and crushed the field with Automatic All-American honors and a 55.17 time for the title.

It was a full second slower than his 2018 time, but only five of the 24 qualifiers at this year's meet could beat the 1:00.00 mark.

The state's next impressive sophomore stepped up in Frazier's place, with Frandsen earning Automatic All-American spots with 1:37.75 in the 200 freestyle and the aforementioned record time in the 500 freestyle.



Finishing with 226 points, Ankeny claimed its first state team swimming championship. The IHSAA has given out a team title at state swimming since 1938.

Both Frazier and Frandsen are sure to continue their historic high school runs with their school and club times.

Group of three-time champs, great freshmen class shine at state

DES MOINES, Iowa – The show delivered again.

The 2019 edition of the Iowa High School State Wrestling Championships packed Wells Fargo Arena in downtown Des Moines with student-athletes and communities from across Iowa in February, crowding in for an exceptional traditional tournament and Saturday's titles.

Four wrestlers wrapped up their 2018-19 seasons with their third individual championships: Akron-Westfield's John Henrich; Assumption, Davenport's Julien Broderson; Lisbon's Cael Happel; and West Sioux, Hawarden's Adam Allard. The latter two champs will have an opportunity to return next winter and join the class of storied four-time state champions. Henrich and Broderson closed out their varsity careers on the highest of notes and after completing undefeated seasons.

The three-day tournament was also highlighted by an outstanding freshmen class that stepped up in the biggest matches and could leave its mark in the state history books. Twelve members of the Class of 2022 were finalists wrestling on Saturday night and six won championships in their competitive weight classes.

Team honors were claimed before the championship bouts, even in parity-filled Class 2A, with familiar names at the top for long-time wrestling fans. Waverly-Shell Rock won its first traditional tournament title since wrapping up its run of four straight in 2011, topping perennial power Southeast Polk in 3A. West Delaware emerged at the top of 2A to add to Wednesday's dual team title, scoring 76.5 points in a field where 21 teams tallied at least 30 team points. And in 1A, Don Bosco, Gilbertville returned for what is set up to be another sizable run at the top, scoring 151 team points to second-place

Lisbon's 104.5. The Dons did not win an individual title, but put all 10 of their qualifiers on the podium and doubled up with a dual team title.

Waverly-Shell Rock completes climb back in 3A

Guided by 11 tournament qualifiers and coach Eric Whitcome, the Go-Hawks returned to state tournament glory by claiming their sixth team title and first since 2011. Waverly-Shell Rock put nine on the podium and saved its biggest cheers for Saturday night, getting a title at 285 pounds from senior Andrew Snyder.

The Go-Hawks had to hold off second-place Southeast Polk and 2018 champ Fort Dodge in third, with Ankeny Centennial and Waukee rounding out four CIML squads in 3A's top five. Southeast Polk had won four state team titles since the last time Waverly-Shell Rock raised the trophy, but settled for an impressive performance on Saturday night and getting individual championships from Lance Runyon (152), Cade DeVos (160), and Gabe

Christenson (195). DeVos was a repeat winner after taking 145 in 2018. Fort Dodge had two early title-winners at 113 and 120 from super sophomore Drake Ayala and junior Carson Taylor.

Beau Lombardi won an emotional title at 220 for Valley, West Des Moines, getting embraced by family and friends after the physical overtime final, including brother Rocky who dropped a dramatic overtime final of his own at 220 in 2017. Trever Anderson was a freshman champ at 106 for Ankeny, and Caleb Rathjen at 126 gave the Hawks two title-winners on Saturday night.

West Delaware wins wide open 2A

Class 2A was up for grabs as usual through two days at Wells Fargo Arena, with more than a dozen teams realistically vying for a team title and boasting finalists. Coach Jeff Voss's Hawks ended up holding on with 76.5 points, chased by Spirit Lake Park (63.5), Clear Lake (62.5), Union (60.5), Solon (58.5) and more in the final standings.

West Delaware improbably finished without a finalist, but in a year that saw no 2A school claim more than one individual champion, found it to be enough. The win adds to West Delaware's team titles in 1991 and 2013.

Among the 14 champions was Broderson, a dominant winner at 195 and three-time champ at Assumption. The Iowa State wrestling recruit is also a title-winning baseball player and finished 53-0 as a senior with only one match going all six minutes. Centerville sophomore Matthew Lewis also repeated as champ, this time at 113.

Two freshmen will be ones to watch in the future: Crestwood's Carter Fousek at 106 and Solon's Hayden Taylor at 126 were impressive in their fields and finished the weekend with their arms raised. Four 2018 runners-up also stepped to the top of the podium this February: Clear Lake's Eric Faught at 132, Spirit Lake Park's Kyler Rieck at 152, Woodward-Granger's Cody Fisher at 220 and Clarion-Goldfield-Dows' Spencer Trenary at 285.

Don Bosco writes next chapter in 1A rivalry


Don Bosco's 11th traditional tournament team championship came despite not winning an individual title and rival Lisbon taking three in a row on Saturday night. The Dons put 10 on the podium and put the team race away early on, led by finalists in senior Daniel Kimball (120) freshman Carson Tenold (160) and junior Thomas Even (182).

Lisbon and coach Brad Smith finished a distant second, but struck gold with freshman Robert Avila Jr. at 126, three-time champion Cael Happel at 132, and senior champ Cobe Siebrecht at 138. Happel scored bonus points in all four of his bouts and can follow his older brother Carter's path as a four-time state champion next season.

West Sioux's Adam Allard continued his ascent, taking the title at 120 after winning 106 as a freshman and 113 as a sophomore. Akron-Westfield's John Henrich completed a three-peat as well, dominating at 160 for his third consecutive championship at the physical weight class. AHSTW's Gabe Pauley repeated atop the podium, taking a sudden victory win over Even in the finals at 182.

SE Polk, West Delaware, Don Bosco take dual team titles

DES MOINES, Iowa – The three top seeds in the state dual team tournament took home titles to open the week at state wrestling inside Wells Fargo Arena. Southeast Polk (3A), West Delaware (2A), and Don Bosco, Gilbertville (1A) each claimed their class championships with impressive scorelines to add to their trophy cases.

Southeast Polk continued its odd year success, stacking another trophy on to dual team titles in 2013, 2015, and 2017. The Rams routed their early round opponents and held off their rival for the week, Waverly-Shell Rock, in a 37-27 final. Coach Jason Christenson's squad jumped out to a 19-0 lead on the Go-Hawks and used two late pins from Devin Harmison at 113 pounds and Joel Jesuroga at 120 to secure the win.

West Delaware won its first dual team title since 1991 by cruising to wins over Sergeant Bluff-Luton, Crestwood, and Solon by a combined margin of 84 points. The massive 2A roster never trailed in team scoring in their duals and won the final, 45-12.

Don Bosco repeated as 1A dual team champ and won its 10th dual title in the process, with coach Tom Hogan's team crushing their first two foes and topping local rival Denver in the final, 48-18. The win extended the Dons' record for most appearances in the state dual tournament and gave them the most dual crowns in state history.

Crestwood, Independence, and PCM, Monroe were making their state dual tournament debuts, and all were in the Class 2A field. Ankeny Centennial cracked the field for the first time in 3A and finished in third after close wins over Bettendorf and 2018 champion Fort Dodge. West Sioux was making its second state duals appearance and left with a third-place finish in the 1A field after topping Lisbon in the consolation final.

All three classes finished with the two top-seeded teams squaring off in the finals, with No. 1 beating No. 2.

Team champs break through, Beaham's 300 shines in Waterloo



Cadillac XBC played host to the State Co-Ed Bowling Championships for the second year in a row, with the IHSAA and IGHSAA event moved out of Plaza Lanes in Des Moines following its 2017 fire.

WATERLOO, Iowa – Red Oak and Council Bluffs, Thomas Jefferson excitedly lifted their first IHSAA bowling team titles while Davenport, North returned to the championship a couple days later in a week of exceptional bowling at Cadillac Lanes. The 2019 State Co-Ed Bowling Championships were held at the Waterloo alley for the second year in a row and delivered both cheers and tears in the boys' contests.

Red Oak opened Monday's meet with the Class 1A championship after finishing as state runner-up on four previous occasions. Council Bluffs, Thomas Jefferson used excellent baker game scores to win a hotly-contested 2A event. And Davenport, North won its fourth state bowling team title in the postponed 3A meet, taking first for the first time since 2014 when the event was at Plaza Lanes in Des Moines.

The individual highlights came from Louisa-Muscatine's Dustin Beaham and Xavier, Cedar Rapids' Dale Weaver who bowled a 300 and 296, respectively, to take the 1A and 2A titles. Beaham's 300 was the third in state meet history and helped him secure back-to-back finishes atop the 1A field.

More details from each day are below.

Wildcats wrap up 3A titles

Paced by individual champion Bryan Verdon's 494 and three teammates with scores over 400, Davenport, North claimed its state-best fourth team title since bowling was sanctioned in 2010. Coach Jeff Strouth's squad held off fellow Eastern Iowa foes Pleasant Valley (3,053), Cedar Rapids, Jefferson (3,031), and Muscatine (3,017) with a team total of 3,183. Verdon is the school's second individual state champ after Zach Fries won 2A in 2013.

Individual qualifier Tristan Corcoran from Waterloo, West took second overall with a 483, closely followed by Pleasant Valley's Alton Barber (482) in third with Muscatine's Noah Miller (465), and Cedar Rapids, Jefferson's Matt Kitzmiller (449) rounding out the top five. Waukee's individual qualifier Joe Jensen finished 10th overall as the highest-placing freshman in this year's field. Verdon's consistency with 257 and 237 games was enough to fend off great second games from Corcoran (277) and Barber (268) for the title.

Waukee took the girls' team title by placing three in the top 10 on the lanes next to the boys' squads.

Thrilled T.J. takes 2A

With the top four team scores separated by just 29 pins at Tuesday's 2A meet, anxiety poured through the packed crowd at Cadillac XBC as final counts were read off. Once the close scores cleared up, only one squad started hugging, crying, and jumping for joy: Council Bluffs, Thomas Jefferson, state bowling champions for the first time.



Marshalltown was making its fifth straight state meet appearance, tied for most all-time among large-class squads.

Bowling

Coach Diane Storey's squad used the margin from its fifth and final baker game to improbably take home the title, scoring 3,175 over North Scott, Eldridge (3,157), defending champ West Delaware (3,150), and fourth-place Ottumwa (3,146). The Yellow Jackets had four bowlers better than 400 in their individual games, paced by senior Andrew Chavarria's 471 and sophomore Max Schuster's 452. Thomas Jefferson was the 2A runner-up in 2017 and qualified for the meet in 2018, but made the leap in 2019 with a close-knit squad.

Xavier, Cedar Rapids junior Dale Weaver had the morning's individual highlight, going for a 300 in his second game and coming up just short to finish with a 296 on his final roll. His two-game 512 was good enough for the 2A individual title, followed by North Scott's Isaac Neymeyer (479) in second, Chavarria in third, Ottumwa's Dawson Greene (465) in fourth, and West Delaware's Brandon Larsen (464) in fifth.

The girls' event was a showcase for Fort Dodge and junior Leah Sanck, who rolled an outstanding 268-266—534 to take the individual title with one of the best scores in state meet history.



Louisa-Muscatine junior Dustin Beaham rolled a 535 to win the Class 1A title, tied for the second-highest two-game score in state meet history.

Beaham's 300, Red Oak get big 1A cheers

Starting off the tournament week with a perfect 300 made Louisa-Muscatine's Dustin Beaham an immediate star. The junior made sure his 2018 individual title in 1A was secure by taking the 2019 crown too, following up his crowd-pleasing 300 with a 235 for the win. Beaham became just the second bowler to repeat as IHSAA state champ and could become the first ever three-time champ in 2020.

Red Oak's Noah Westerlund was Beaham's closest indi-

vidual competition, bowling a two-game 480 and leading the Tigers to their first state team title after four other occasions coming up in second place.

Scoring issues delayed the official team trophy race, with Red Oak (3,135), Camanche (3,098), Durant (2,993), and Central DeWitt (2,965) taking the top four final scores.

Louisa-Muscatine also posted the top two girls' scores and won the girls' team title in 1A.

Grand View wins third straight, Cedar Falls repeats, Oskaloosa and North Linn take first hoops titles



DES MOINES, Iowa – Great crowds and close contests highlighted the 2019 state tournament at Wells Fargo Arena, with 32 programs playing in downtown Des Moines from March 4-8. The second Finals Friday featured a three-peat from Grand View Christian, titles for the first time to North Linn and Oskaloosa, then a back-to-back cap to the week from Cedar Falls.

Nineteen games in the action-packed week were decided by less than 10 points, including Alburnett's semifinal buzzer-beater, Dubuque Senior's overtime win over Waukee, and all three of Oskaloosa's nail-biting victories on the way to the Class 3A crown.

CLASS 4A

Cedar Falls 44, Dubuque, Senior 41

Cedar Falls repeated as Class 4A state champion after a hard fought 44-41 win over Dubuque, Senior in Friday night's title game.

The Tigers (21-3) didn't meet their Mississippi Valley Conference foe in the regular season, saving their lone matchup for Wells Fargo Arena with trophies on the line. All-Tournament Team captain Logan Wolf led Cedar Falls with 15 points, six rebounds, and five assists as his team couldn't truly secure the win until Senior's final half-court heave bounced off the backboard.

Senior (19-4) by as many as eight in a physical second half,

but managed to tie the game up with 1:20 remaining on a Sam Link 3-pointer. Noah Carter led the Rams with 12 points and seven rebounds, and Link added 11, but their final varsity game ended with a runner-up trophy. Senior finished second at the state tournament for the second time.

Cedar Falls repeated after winning its first state title last winter. Despite the loss of 2018 All-Tournament Team captain – and newly-minted Freshman of the Year in his college league – A.J. Green, the Tigers came back and coach Ryan Schultz's squad won the large-school class again.

CLASS 3A**Oskaloosa 48, Norwalk 44**

In their third meeting of the season, Oskaloosa claimed the all-important win: The Class 3A championship over Little Hawkeye Conference rival Norwalk, 48-44 in front of a packed Wells Fargo Arena crowd on Friday night.

The hard-earned win marked Oskaloosa's (19-5) first state championship, clinched in the last 20 seconds with a Cole Henry put-back and Iszac Schultz's pressure-packed free throws. Henry finished with 19 points and 14 rebounds, 10 coming on the offensive end, as coach Ryan Parker's club used their interior length advantage against top seed Norwalk.

Bowen Born led the Warriors (22-5) for the third straight game, scoring 26 points with four assists. The junior guard was named All-Tournament Team captain after the effort, trying with his teammates to shoot over or around Henry and Oskaloosa's 7-foot junior Xavier Foster.

Norwalk held a 31-30 advantage after an electric first half, but the two defenses tightened up after the break and Norwalk lost its lead for good in the final two minutes of the third quarter.

Norwalk finished as runner-up for the second time, with its only other finals appearance coming in 2009. Oskaloosa's first title appearance came last year, in a loss to Glenwood.

CLASS 2A**North Linn, Troy Mills 60, Boyden-Hull 41**

Putting an exclamation point on an unbeaten season, North Linn, Troy Mills took home the Class 2A state championship on Friday afternoon with its 60-41 victory over Boyden-Hull.

The Lynx (26-0) scored 39 points after halftime to break open a tight title game, using 20 points from senior Jake

Hilmer and 17 from Trevor Boge to win their program's first crown. Hilmer's father Mike won his first title and grandfather Bob won his second as the squad's co-coaches. Jake added eight rebounds, eight assists, and four steals to cap his second straight year as All-Tournament Team captain.

Boyden-Hull (24-3) was playing in its eighth title game and held the speedy Lynx to just 21 points in the first half. The Comet defense eventually couldn't keep North Linn out, and the Siouxland Conference squad struggled to keep up, despite getting points from eight different players. Spencer Te Slaa had a team-high 10 points.

North Linn is 2A's first unbeaten state champion since 2014.

CLASS 1A**Grand View Christian 43, Alburnett 24**

Grand View Christian persevered through a plodding start to Friday's 1A championship game to earn their third straight state title in a 43-24 victory over seventh-seeded underdog Alburnett.

The Pirates (20-6) opted for a slow pace against the bigger and more athletic Des Moines-based program, only managing six points in the first half and struggling to keep up late. In their first ever state tournament appearance under long-time coach Jeff Christopherson, Alburnett still managed to keep its fans and neutral supporters involved despite shooting just 8-of-33 over the 32-minute game. Hunter Caves led the Pirates with eight points and eight rebounds.

Grand View Christian became the first squad to win three straight 1A crowns since Palmer accomplished the feat from 1986-88, and just the seventh ever. Harouna Sissoko led the Thunder (26-1) with 10 points, but All-Tournament Team captain Issa Samake added nine points, 11 rebounds, four steals, and three assists.

Grand View Christian's lone loss in the 2018-19 season came to 4A state tournament qualifier Iowa City, West. Alburnett advanced as far as it could in its state tournament debut, but was held to the lowest point total in a championship game in the four-class era.





Wrestling Hall of Fame adds 7 in 2019

DES MOINES, Iowa – Five wrestlers and two coaches were inducted in the IHSAA's 2019 Wrestling Hall of Fame class. All seven honorees attended a reception at the Iowa Hall of Pride and were inducted at Wells Fargo Arena before the state wrestling finals on February 16. Their biographical information is below:

MARK BERTSCH



Bertsch's wrestling career began in 1970 at Dubuque, Senior where he was coached and inspired by Hall of Famer Bill Dotson. Upon graduation, his collegiate career began at Arizona Western Junior College. Mark returned home to wrestle his final two years at Loras College under the guidance of Pat Flanagan. While at Loras, he served as team captain and was a two-time national qualifier. Bertsch then began teaching and coaching at Newman Catholic in Mason City, where he has spent his entire 40-year career. Heading into this season, he had acquired 380 dual victories, 78 state tournament qualifiers, 45 place-winners, 14 finalists, and eight state champions. His teams finished 3rd, 5th, and 6th at the State traditional tournament.

Bertsch helped develop the first state dual ranking system for the state of Iowa in the 1990s and served as president of the IWCOA in 2003-04. Bertsch and his wife Deb reside in Mason City, where they raised daughter Carrie and son Matthew. Carrie was a team manager and cheerleader at Newman while Matthew was a two-time wrestling place-winner.

TRENT GOODALE, Osage



Just the third wrestler in Osage's outstanding wrestling history to win three state championships, Goodale was a four-time finalist and also led the program to the 2001 dual team championship. Gradually working his way up, Goodale won the 112 pounds title as a sophomore in 1999, then 119 in 2000, and 125 as a senior in 2001. He finished with a career varsity record of

159-6. He would go on to become a four-year letterwinner at the University of Iowa, earning NCAA qualification as a member of two second-place squads in 2003 and 2004. Goodale immediately jumped into coaching, helping with Iowa City, West and then moving to NCAA Division II Limestone College in 2006 as an assistant coach. He was thrust into an interim head coaching role in 2008 and thrived at the South Carolina school, becoming one of the youngest head coaches in all of NCAA sports and had stayed at Limestone until 2015. He also served as a coach for the USA Women's Freestyle team at multiple international events. Goodale returned to Iowa and he and his family now live outside of Osage.

BILL PLEIN



The coach behind more than 400 dual team victories over 28 seasons at Columbus Community, Columbus Junction has won two state tournament titles and three state dual team championships. The Wildcats won the Class 1A team title in 1995 and stepped up to take Class 2A in 1997 under Plein's leadership. The years Columbus finished as traditional tournament runner-up — 1996, 1998 and 1999 — it won the dual team championships. His squads finished with a 404-88-1 dual team record, making him the 13th coach in state history to top the 400-win mark. Columbus Community featured 10 individual state champions and nearly 50 place-winners during Plein's run. That count included five wrestlers with more than 150 career varsity wins each. He took over at Notre Dame-West Burlington/Danville for the first time in the 2018-19 season.

A Waukon native and eventual standout at Central College, he learned and grew his own coaching tree in southeast Iowa. An athletic director at Wapello until 2018 and now at Notre Dame, Plein has previously also coached softball, baseball, football, and track. Plein has also served as a USA Wrestling coach and official. The son of Francis and Marguerite Plein, he has a stepson, Brandon Janssen.

MARK RIAL, Fort Dodge



A four-time state qualifier and three-time finalist, Rial's varsity career ramped up as a sophomore, when he reeled off a 115-2 record in his last three seasons. That mark included 90 falls and eight technical falls, leading to two state titles for the Dodgers: 103 pounds in 1994, and 125 pounds in 1996. A four-time CIML champion and four-time district champion, Rial finished with a prep record of 134-8 and before he graduated with 100 career

pins in 1996, only four other wrestlers in state history had accomplished the feat.

An accomplished freestyle and Greco-Roman competitor, he was a four-time Cadet and Junior All-American and finished fourth at the Cadet World Championships in 1994. He left Fort Dodge with a hand in three team runner-up trophies. Rial would go on to be a three-year starter at UNI, then qualify for five national teams in Greco, including a 2008 national title and 2009 runner-up World Team Trials finish. An assistant at UNI from 2008-10 and Iowa Central from 2010-17, Rial is currently head wrestling coach at Buena Vista. He and his wife Lindsey have two sons, Trace and Parker, and live in Fort Dodge.

JIMMY RODGERS, Riverside, Oakland



Born into a family of accomplished wrestlers, Rodgers was a prodigy, winning 16 youth state titles across folkstyle, freestyle, and Greco. Then he joined the high school ranks and led Riverside to its best wrestling run ever, winning three state championships and helping claiming a 1996 traditional team title and dual team runner-up finish. Rodgers finished sixth as an

undersized freshman, then reeled off state tournament wins at 119 pounds in 1995, 135 in 1996, and 145 in 1997. He went 46-0 as a junior — then as “Jimmie” — as the Bulldogs and coach Mitch Anderson edged out Bill Plein’s Columbus for the Class 1A crown.

Rodgers then went on to wrestle collegiately with Iowa State, Nebraska, and Nebraska-Omaha. Rodgers currently owns and coaches Warriors Wrestling club in Omaha, leading youth wrestlers near where he grew up grappling. He and his wife Katie live in Omaha with their daughter Ella and son Maxum.

MERLE ROTHS, New Hampton



Roths was the the 105-pound champion as a junior in 1941, then the second-lowest class among the 10 weight levels, then competed in what is believed to be the longest match in state tournament history as a senior in 1942. The scoreless 14-minute final at 112 pounds against Council Bluff, Thomas Jefferson’s Bob Hunt was given

to Hunt on an official’s decision after two extended overtime periods, and Roths finished the tournament in third. Roths was featured on cover of 1942 tournament program as one of two returning champions, and he also was state runner-up in 1940. Roths was also a three-time district champ in the single-classification era.

An advocate for the sport from a proud wrestling family, Roths would later mentor wrestlers and assisted with the introduction of Vinton’s school wrestling program. The son of Alfred and Caroline Roths, the 95-year-old recently celebrated his 70th wedding anniversary with wife Evelyn. Merle and Evelyn are the parents of Michael and the late Bruce and Sheila.

JOSH WATTS, Assumption, Davenport



Watts graduated with one of the state’s most impressive resumes ever, winning three championships and 190 matches, at that time the most varsity victories in IHSAA history. He was an integral piece of back-to-back Class 2A title teams for Assumption and coach Wade King in 1998 and 1999, winning traditional tournament and dual team crowns. Watts went 190-4 as a prep

with 114 pins, taking three losses in 1999, his only season without an individual title as he completed the postseason with a leg injury. He won 103 pounds in 1998, 125 in 2000, and 135 in 2001 for the Knights. His dominant career varsity point margin: 1,320 to 246. Watts would go on to wrestle at UNI from 2001-03 and Loras College from 2003-05.

His natural next step as a coach has made a junior college architect, starting at Darton College and then arriving at Iowa Western Community College in 2011. He helped create the program that is now a consistent top 10 finisher in NJCAA. Watts and his wife Cari live in Council Bluffs and have four sons: Aidan (11), Jaxson (10), Karver (5), and Maverick (2).

Nine inducted to 2019 Basketball Hall of Fame

DES MOINES, Iowa – Seven players and two coaches were selected for the IHSAA's 2019 Basketball Hall of Fame class, headlined by 1999 Co-Mr. Basketball selections and retired NBA stars Nick Collison and Kirk Hinrich.

All nine honorees were inducted at Wells Fargo Arena during the Class 3A championship game on March 8. Their biographical information is below:

JASON BOHANNON, Linn-Mar, Marion



The oldest of four standout brothers kick-started Linn-Mar's state tournament streak with a Class 4A championship with all-state and all-tournament honors as a sophomore in 2004. The Lions finished as 4A runner-up in 2005 and in fourth in 2006, with Bohannon earning first-team all-state honors both times. Bohannon scored 722 points in senior season, then good for fifth in 4A history, winning Mr. Basketball and Gatorade Player of the Year honors.

He would go on to become a four-year letterwinner and NCAA Tournament participant at Wisconsin, winning the Big Ten title and a Sweet 16 berth in 2008. After graduation, Bohannon played professionally in the NBA D-League and in Germany. His playing career wrapped up in 2011 and he is now a financial advisor in Cedar Rapids, where he lives with his wife Hayley.

NICK COLLISON, Iowa Falls



An All-American forward who won 74 of his last 75 varsity games, Collison led the Cadets on undefeated title runs in Class 2A in 1998 and 1999. Including a tournament berth in 1997, his three-year varsity record was 74-1 and included three first team all-state honors. He led the class in scoring and became all-tournament team captain in both title seasons while playing for

his father Dave. His award-winning senior season included the McDonald's All-American Game at Hilton Coliseum and a finalist spot as Gatorade National Player of the Year.

After sharing Mr. Basketball honors with Kirk Hinrich in 1999, Collison went on to All-American career with two Final Four appearances at Kansas. He was NABC National Player of the Year and Big 12 Player of the Year that season. Collison would become the 12th pick in the NBA Draft and embark on a 15-year career with Seattle, which later became Oklahoma City. He retired in 2018 as "Mr. Thunder" and will have his jersey retired later this month. He currently resides in Kansas City and has a daughter, Emma.

DENNIS GERAGHTY

The Staten Island, New York native retired last spring at Epworth, Western Dubuque after hitting 500 total wins in 39 seasons as a head coach. Geraghty arrived in Iowa to play at



Ellsworth and St. Ambrose, then Geraghty made multiple successful stops as a teacher and coach in Iowa and the Midwest. His program list includes: Preston, North Dakota State, Columbus Lakeview (NE), Parkersburg, Creston, Dubuque Hempstead, Loras, West Delaware, Tipton, Clarke College, and eventually 10 years at Western Dubuque. Geraghty took West Delaware to state in 1999 and 2000 and Western Dubuque in 2010 and 2012, winning nine WaMac titles in the process. His squads finished as the Class 3A runner-up in 2000 and 2012. He and his wife Juli still live in Dubuque and have a son, Nathan, and daughter, Kelsey (Nick) Freiberger.

KIRK HINRICH, Sioux City, West



The leader for four straight Class 4A state tournament teams – the only four West has ever had – under his father and head coach Jim, Hinrich ended his varsity career in 1999 with the Class 4A title. West also advanced to the finals in 1997, with Hinrich earning all-tourney team captain honors both times. He remains the school's all-time leader in points, assists, and steals, and shared Mr. Basketball with Nick Collison. Hinrich was a first team all-state selection in his junior and senior seasons.

He then went on to a stellar four-year run at Kansas, twice in the Final Four and twice an All-American. He and Collison were part of KU's two Big 12 titles, including a 16-0 stretch in 2002, and the instantly classic 2003 NCAA Championship game against Syracuse. Hinrich was the seventh overall pick in the 2003 NBA Draft and would go on to play 12 years in the league with stops in Chicago, Washington, and Atlanta. He is the Bulls' all-time leader in made 3-pointers. He now lives in Sioux Falls with his wife Jill and children, Kenzie (10), Kyla (7), and twins Kinley and Kolton (4).

KEN LAFFOON



The coach and supervisor over two dominant stretches at Danville capped his career and retired in 2018 with a record of 508-181. The Bears qualified for seven state tournaments with Laffoon in charge, and took home the Class 2A championship in 2001 and 2002. A native of Sheldon, Illinois, he went on to play college basketball at Minnesota State-Moorhead. Laffoon

started his coaching and teaching career at Beach (ND) and Midland, Wyoming before finding a home at the southeast Iowa program. A seven-time conference coach of the year and eight-time IBCA district or substate coach of the year, his squads also earned runner-up finishes in 2011 and 2012, followed by tourney berths in 2013, 2015, and 2016. In the three seasons from 2011-13, his teams only lost three total games, all at Wells Fargo Arena. Laffoon and his wife Stacy have five children: Stephanie Moore, Karissa Laffoon, Samantha Johnson, Sydney Johnson, and Caleb Wilkerson.

KYLE McCANN, Creston



A multi-sport star, McCann paced the Panthers to a third-place finish in 1996 and a state championship in 1997 and graduated as the program's all-time leading scorer with 1,857 points. He was a two-time first team all-state pick in both football and basketball, and was a hoops all-tournament team pick in both state appearances. McCann scored 151 points in six career

state tournament games and twice led Class 3A in scoring.

He would go on to play quarterback at the University of Iowa and was a four-year letterwinner who graduated at No. 5 on the school's career passing yardage list. He carried on in his football career with the New York Jets and Barcelona Dragons in NFL Europe, then attended law school at Creighton University. McCann currently serves as executive director of The Native Fund, an Iowa non-profit for natural disaster recovery efforts. The son of Steve and Jane McCann (Steve is in the IHSAA Officials Hall of Fame), he now lives in West Des Moines with his wife Maggie and daughters Sadie (9), Grace (8), and Claire (5).

DENNIS PAULING, Paullina



The first in a famous Northwest Iowa program's lineage of all-state posts, Pauling helped Paullina win 74 games as four-year starter and 1962 grad. He averaged nearly 20 points and 20 rebounds as junior and senior, earning all-state honors and graduating with 1,452 career points. Pauling was also part of an unbeaten varsity football team, a state champion Class B track

team, where he medaled in the football throw and helped win the 880-yard relay.

An exemplary student-athlete and leader, Pauling went on to play at the University of Iowa, where he was a two-year starter and earned two degrees in engineering while winning the Nile Kinnick Scholarship and Big Ten All-Academic honors. Pauling then served four years in the Air Force as a captain based out of Dayton, Ohio. His career then took him as director of engineering at Procter and Gamble and international engineering manager for PepsiCo. He retired in 2005. Pauling and his wife Sharon have been married for 52 years and have two daughters: Kristen Doyle and Jennifer Daves.

GRANT STOUT, North Mahaska



A 2002 and 2003 first team all-state pick, Stout started all 94 games of his four-year varsity career and led North Mahaska to a third-place finish in his senior year. Stout set North Mahaska's career records in points (1,985), rebounds (1,004), blocks (257), made field goals (780), and field goal percentage (62%), and still holds many of the school's single-game and season

marks.

Also a place-winner in track, the New Sharon native went on to play at UNI and became the program's career leader in blocks (222) from 2003-07, playing in three NCAA Tournaments in the process. Stout played professionally in France and Germany until undergoing a heart surgery in 2007. He began working for Musco Lighting in 2008 and remains with the Oskaloosa-based company. Stout now lives in Altoona with his wife Alex and children, Anora (4), Loudon (3), and Rheyra (five months).

BRIAN WILDEBOER, Colo-Nesco



He helped lead the Royals to two Class A finals in 1989 and 1990, winning the state title while battling cancer and undergoing chemotherapy in his senior season. Colo-Nesco racked up a 67-9 record with Wildeboer as a starter. An all-state post and two-time captain of the all-tournament team, Wildeboer is the program's record-holder in career and single season rebounds and

blocked shots. Diagnosed with Ewing's Sarcoma before his senior season, he missed nine games, playing in some games just two days after treatments, and his performance stepped up at the state tournament, averaging 17 points, 10 rebounds, and three blocks at his senior tourney.

A Simpson basketball player and graduate, he currently worked for Principal Financial out of Ames, where he lives with his wife Janet. He has two children, Jonathan (Justine) and Sam, and a six-month old granddaughter, Lucy.

DUANE BUTTENOB, Aurelia: A high school coach and athletic director, Mr. Buttenob passed away on February 3 at the age of 91. In a life and career of education, he was a 1989 IHSAA Basketball Hall of Fame coach and a 1990 honoree of the School Administrator Award, honoring those who advocated for activity programs for students. A native of Howard, South Dakota, he had his secondary education in Minnesota where he was a four-sport star. After graduation, he served his country in World War II with the Navy Seabees. Following the war, he attended college Northwestern Junior College and later Westmar College, majoring in education, while marrying his wife Chris who passed away in 2003. Affectionately known as 'Nobby,' he coached 35 years at Quimby and later Aurelia, where he took them to Iowa State Boys Basketball Tournament in 1974 and 1978. At retirement, his career win-loss record was 471-260, ranking 10th in the number of wins at the time. He also taught and served as an athletic director in Iowa for 40 years. He and Chris raised two daughters - Carole (Rodney) Nelson of Marion and Karen Amirsoltani of Crystal Lake, Illinois. He is also survived by five grandchildren and five great grandchildren and four step great grandchildren and his friend Margaret Hedstrom and family.

RON "FOX" CLINTON, Creston: Mr. Clinton, 82, passed away January 6 at Iowa Methodist Medical Center in Des Moines. He was born in Gearsy, Oklahoma, and the family settled in Council Bluffs when he was four years old. He graduated from Thomas Jefferson High School in 1954 and earned his BA Degree from Simpson College in 1958. In 1958 Ron married Ruth Kinsey in Grimes. In 1959 they moved their young family to Creston, where Ron started teaching at Burton R. Jones Jr. High School. He received his MS Degree from Northwest Missouri State University and in 1964 began his long career with Southwestern Community College where he was a coach, athletic director, and teacher. For his lifetime of support to Southwestern Community College he was the first inductee to the Athletic Hall of Fame in 2013. EDWARD L. COLBERT, Dubuque: Colbert, 91, passed away January 24 at UnityPoint Health-Finley Hospital. He was born and raised in Iowa City. After high school he served in the United States Army during WWII. He attended the University of Iowa on an athletic scholarship, earning his B.A. while playing basketball all four years. In 1951, while coaching and teaching at Fertile, he married his wife Darlene and later spent four years at Mason City Holy Name. In 1959 he started

the basketball team and helped build and coach the baseball team at newly opened Wahlert High School. He coached and taught 21 years as the Golden Eagles made 10 state basketball tournament appearances with eight final-four finishes. After retiring from Wahlert, he was the athletic director and basketball coach at Clarke University. He won several honors including induction into the IHSAA Basketball Hall of Fame and the Iowa Softball Fast Pitch Hall of Fame. The Wahlert gym floor, Colbert-Delaney Court, was named after him and his assistant, Frank Delaney. WILLIAM J. FLEMING, Urbandale: Fleming, 76, passed away January 17, at his home after a long battle with an acute lung disease. He was born on March 14, 1942 in Waterloo, and was a 1960 graduate of Traer High School. He received his BS degree from Iowa State University where he played baseball. He continued his coaching career for 10 seasons at Mid-America Nazarene University in Olathe, Kansas, as an assistant under one of his former Maquoketa players, Rocky Lamar. Their teams won a national championship in 2007 and appeared in four straight NAIA Final Fours. 2019 SPRING GOLF CLASSIFICATIONS – Assistant Director Elsberry presented the classifications to be used for the 2019 spring golf postseason. (MM-S) Wiebers-Schwamman to approve the classifications as presented. Motion carried unanimously.

2019 TENNIS CLASSIFICATIONS – Executive Director Beste presented the classifications to be used for the 2019 tennis season. (MM-S) Earleywine-Cook to approve the classifications as presented. Motion carried unanimously.
