Officiating open to high schoolers for sub-varsity games

In an effort to increase the potential pool of registered officials and better include interested students, the Iowa High School Athletic Association will begin allowing high school students to serve as officials for sub-varsity high school contests in 2019-20.

Current policies allow high schoolers to officiate seventh- and eighth-grade events or sub-varsity soccer matches. The change proposed with the officials' advisory committee and approved at June's meeting of the IHSAA's Board of Control aims to help an active group of young officials gain invaluable experience and education, and allow school administrators to more flexibility to schedule and staff sub-varsity contests.

"The officials' shortage is a nationwide issue that we're seeing up close here in Iowa," former executive director Alan Beste said in June. "We have students trying out officiating and wanting more opportunities, and at the same time, their school's administrators and coaches are desperate to find referees for freshmen, sophomore, or junior varsity events."

"These sub-varsity contests should be a learning experience for all involved, and we're excited about the opportunities this could create at the local level."

The student exception for soccer officiating was added when the IHSAA first sanctioned the sport in 1993, with the intention of lifting a low number of soccer officials. However, soccer has added registered officials despite the overall number of IHSAA registered officials decreasing by 10 percent between 2007-08 and 2017-18.

The advisory committee agreed the sport has benefited by having interested high school students available to assist and member schools have expressed interest in hiring those students. Besides the testing, rules meetings, and clinic attendance required for registered officials, the IHSAA will explore adding educational components for the high school-aged officials.

"This is a great chance to open up officiating for high school-aged officials and for school athletic administrators," IHSAA director of officials Lewie Curtis said.

The annual per sport officiating registration fee for high school students is \$20, with each additional sport costing \$12.

IHSAA Classification Committee to meet in fall

The IHSAA and the Board of Control has discussed and confirmed the assembly of the Classification Committee for this fall.

The committee is put together to study and review the organization's sport classification structure and submit possible recommendations to the Board of Control. Appointments are made among administrators from varying regions, enrollment sizes, and school types across the state, as well as Board of Control and Representative Council members. The committee last met in 2017.

The group's make-up at that 2017 meeting consisted of principals, superintendents, and athletic directors from all five IHSAA geographic districts, with 14 members from public schools, and three from non-public schools. The breakdown by class: three from 4A, six from 3A, five from 2A, and three from 1A.

Additionally, the IHSAA has received a form memo from around 20 member schools districts as, "IAHSAA & IGHSAA School Classification Equity Resolution." The resolution requests the investigation of classification structures which extend beyond using student enrollment as the sole criteria for postseason placement.

The IHSAA currently offers six classifications for football, four classifications for baseball, basketball, cross country, golf, and track and field. Bowling, soccer, and wrestling each have three classes of competition. Tennis is a two-class sport and swimming is the only single-class sport.

The IHSAA formulates football districts and their corresponding schedules every two years. The IHSAA neither creates competition schedules nor mandates conference affiliations for any other regular season events.

Scrimmage travel limitations lifted for 2019-20

The old 100-mile travel cap for IHSAA sanctioned scrimmages has been removed for all sports ahead of the 2019-20 school year.

The Board of Control approved a proposal in June to allow scrimmages to be played anywhere in Iowa, bordering states, and Kansas, similar to the IHSAA's recent interstate policies for regular season contests.

"Our school administrators have reached out over the restrictions placed on their programs because of our mileage

limit," Beste said. "Allowing them to determine their scrimmage schedules, just as they typically decide their regular season schedules, can help them address their own geographic or competitive considerations."

The number of allowed sanctioned scrimmage dates for applicable sports (baseball, basketball, football, soccer, tennis, wrestling) remains unchanged for 2019-20.

Track & Field

Drake Stadium hosts speedy weekend, photo finishes, Porter's 400 record



Sergeant Bluff-Luton junior Jorma Schwedler won the first of his three Class 3A individual titles in Thursday's 400 meters at Drake Stadium, in front of a Day 1 record crowd of 13,811.

Despite wild weather and scheduling over three days at Drake Stadium in Des Moines, the 2019 Iowa High School Co-Ed State Track & Field Championships delivered an exceptional meet with record crowds. The 114th year of track championships hosted by the IHSAA were the 15th of co-ed competition in conjunction with the Iowa Girls High School Athletic Union, and the combined crowds added up to 38,044, which was the second-best mark ever over three days.

Opening day brought 13,811 fans through for the Blue Oval and field events, good for the biggest Day 1 all-time. The action ended early on May 16 due to storms, then started late on Friday, May 17 with more severe weather and water pouring on the track. That rolling schedule carried through until Saturday's championships, which started early and wrapped up just before the skies opened up with awards being handed out inside Drake's field house.

The participants, teams, meet officials, and Drake Stadium staff handled the schedule bumps well and were as excited as ever to see who the top boys and girls from across the state would be. Valley, West Des Moines claimed its third straight 4A boys' team title with the strength of three relay wins and heaps of valuable placement points. Sergeant Bluff-Luton won its first team title in 3A, led by three relay wins and junior Jorma Schwedler (above).

Dike-New Hartford claimed the 2A team championship, adding to a title that New Hartford won back in 1982. And George-Little Rock took the 1A trophy home with strong distance performances, even though it was tangled in one of the meet's top storylines following Thursday's 3,200 meters.

A summary of each of the four classes follows...

VALLEY THREE-PEATS, PORTER BLAZES

Valley, West Des Moines continues to embrace the "team" aspect of the Class 4A team title, taking home the top trophy for the third year in a row despite not winning any individual events. Coach Tom Trygstad's Tigers won three relay events – 4x100, 4x200, and Shuttle Hurdle – and cruised past their CIML rivals, runner-up Ames and third-place Waukee.

The 4x200 crew of Jon Shaner, J.J. Gass, Ryan Neu, and Jake Keller set a state record with their 1:26.17 relay, sending the Tigers into the final day on a high. Valley's 89 team points were the most in 4A state meet history and tied for fourth-most in any class ever.

Class 4A had other major event highlights, including Ames senior Bernard Bell repeating as 100-meter champ, Ankeny's Tim Sindt taking both the 1,600 and 3,200, Johnston's Joe Schaefer following up a sensational Drake Relays by winning the 800 and anchoring the Dragons to a Distance Medley Relay championship. But even with an awkward weather delay on Thursday night and adjusted Friday afternoon run time, the 4A spotlight was on the final heat of the 400.

Bettendorf's Darien Porter broke the state's all-time mark in the race, holding off Iowa City, West's game Gabe Caruthers to finish in 46.99 and take the state title and a standing ovation-worthy record. Porter broke the previous mark of 47.01 set by Iowa City, City High's Calvin Davis back in 2002. The previous state meet record was 47.33 set by Des Moines,

Roosevelt's Yawusa Kinda in 2004. Caruthers finished in 47.38, which is good for the sixth-fastest time in state history, but resulted in a runner-up finish on a day Porter dominated.

Lewis Central junior Logan Jones won both the shot put and discus with the longest top throws of the weekend.

SERGEANT BLUFF-LUTON SWEEPS

On the strength of junior Jorma Schwedler's sprinting sweep and wins in the 110-meter hurdles, 4x800, Sprint Medley Relay, and Shuttle Hurdle Relay, Sergeant Bluff-Luton staked out its first state track and field team championship in Class 3A.

The Warriors (86 points) ran past competitive squads from Wahlert, Dubuque (52), last year's runner-up Atlantic (48), and Algona (39) for 3A's team title. Schwedler was the standout on a team full of them, taking the 400 title on Thursday in 48.74, then claiming both the 100 final (11.20) and 200 final (22.16) on Saturday afternoon. He also anchored the Sprint Medley squad that won by just two-tenths of a second over Wahlert's quartet.

Atlantic repeated as champ in both the Distance Medley and the 4x400 using the same four sprinters – Zade Niklasen, Colin Mullenix, Tyler Moen, and Chase Mullenix – in different orders to claim the wins.

Both of 3A's jumps finished tight at the top, with Fairfield's Landon Kooiker winning Thursday's high jump contest at 6-7 thanks to clearing the height on his first attempt. Charles City's Ian Collins, Mount Pleasant's Sam Beatty, and Denison-Schleswig's Waw Gach all hit that mark eventually as well, but none could top a final set at 6-9. Bishop Heelan, Sioux City's Keyontre Clark won Friday's long jump at 21-7.25, just one inch better than runner-up Jamison Heinz of Humboldt and two better than Carlisle's Trenton Beck in third.

DIKE-NEW HARTFORD TAKES 2A

Wins in the 4x400 and Shuttle Hurdle Relay led Dike-New Hartford (60 points) to a team title in 2A over competitive ef-

forts from Williamsburg (51) and South Central Calhoun (47).

The Wolverines sealed the title on 2A's final event of the weekend, using 400 hurdles runner-up Grant Bixby on the third leg and long jump champ Parker Kiewiet to anchor the win. Williamsburg had won the 4x100 and 4x200, and South Central Calhoun claimed the Distance Medley and gone 1-2 in the 800 through seniors Chase McAlister and Spencer Moon.

The 2A field featured three different double champs in individual events: Spirit Lake's Joe Stein in the 100 and 200, Garner-Hayfield-Ventura's Reece Smith in the 1,600 and 3,200, and New Hampton's Noah Fenske with the shot put and discus.

GEORGE-LITTLE ROCK RALLIES IN 1A

A wild weekend for George-Little Rock started with a controversial 3,200 finish on Thursday afternoon and ended with a championship trophy on Saturday night. The Mustangs (52 points) topped tough efforts from St. Albert, Council Bluffs (42), Calamus-Wheatland (41), and Lynnville-Sully (36) in a crowded 1A field.

George-Little Rock won the 800 with Payton Maudlin and 1,600 with Joe Anderson, but headlines came out of a hot 3,200 that saw the bell rung one lap too early and meet officials calling the race complete and scoring it without times after seven laps. Gehlen Catholic, LeMars junior Will Rodger was declared the winner and Anderson runner-up. Both eventually received first-place medals following the meet.

Multiple event champs included AHSTW's Drake Partridge (100, 200), Lynnville-Sully's Tyson Vander Linden (400, 400 hurdles, Sprint Medley Relay), and St. Edmond, Fort Dodge's relay groups in the 4x100 and 4x400.

WAUKEE'S CORRELL REPEATS

Though tested closely on the track by Northwood-Kensett freshman Wyatt Willand, Waukee sophomore Evan Correll used wins in the 100, 200, and 400 to win the single-class wheelchair championship for the second year in a row. Willand won the 800 and Northwood-Kensett finished four points behind Waukee. It is the first repeat title in the wheelchair competition since Waterloo, West went back-to-back in 2010 and 2011.

Weather shortens all 2018-19 championships to one round

After a rain-shortened Class 4A fall tournament, the three spring tournaments set for May 23 and 24 were supposed to provide closure for 3A, 2A, and 1A in the 2019 golf season.

Instead, the weather emerged as the state's top finisher.

In the IHSAA's 45 years of 36-hole championships, the 2018-19 athletic year marked the first time that all four classes were cut down due to weather. It was the 92nd year of state golf overall, and only in 1935 was the tournament completely rained out. The 2019 spring golfers got Thursday's 18 holes in, but by early Friday morning, all the scores had unfortunately been declared final. Due to heavy overnight rains and their resulting course conditions, 3A in Fort Dodge, 2A in Marshalltown, and 1A in Newton were done.

The shortened tournament disappointed coaches, players, and spectators, but strong performances resulting in medals and trophies brought smiles back on the podiums.

All three team champs were first-time winners: Nevada in 3A, Des Moines Christian in 2A, and Harris-Lake Park in 1A. The tournament medalists all had clear advantages through 18 holes, with West Delaware's Brandon Larsen winning 3A with a 69, Panorama junior Kolby Shackelford taking 2A by three strokes, and Edgewood-Colesburg's Ethan Streicher winning 1A at 72.

Summaries on the tournaments are below...

CLASS 3A

Despite not placing an individual in the top five, Nevada took home the 3A team championship with an outstanding group effort on Thursday, May 23 at Lakeside Golf Course on the north side of Fort Dodge.

The Cubs won their first team golf title thanks to their four scoring players all firing better than five-over par and staying in the top 20 on the overall leaderboard. Those top four shot 300 and included just one senior: juniors Harold Dobernecker (74), Tyler Sansgaard (75), and Kyle Linder (75) led the way with senior Dylan Sporrer (76) shooting par on the front nine of his final varsity meet. Nevada was strong even outside of its scoring spots, with James Carsrud (81) and Caden Jones (84) rounding out the title-winning squad under coach Ryan Brown.

Runner-up Spirit Lake used a similar performance to climb on the podium after one round, getting Ian Brandt, Jackson Laven, and Mason Weeks all shooting 75 to lead their group 303.

Individually, West Delaware senior Brandon Larsen handled Lakeside well all day en route to a three-under

69, shooting five birdies and taking medalist honors by two strokes. The only other West Delaware golfer to win the state meet was his brother Clayton in 2016.

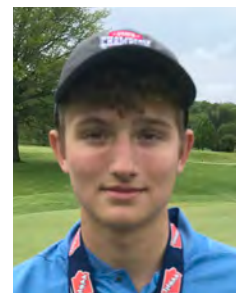
West Burlington/Notre Dame's Matthew Briggs was the only other golfer under par on what was supposed to just be Day 1. His 71 came with three birdies on the back nine to narrowly edge out Atlantic's Matt Gearheart in third and Waverly-Shell Rock freshman Hogan Hansen in fourth at 73. Spencer senior Ezra Meyer finished fifth, also with a 73.

CLASS 2A

Paced by a third-place 73 from senior Nate Juffer and fourth-place 74 by freshman Jake Weissenburger, Des Moines Christian claimed its first state golf team title at American Legion Memorial Golf Course in Marshalltown. The Lions also had top 20 performances from Matthew Wynne (77) and Tommy Weissenburger (80) in their first rounds to raise the Class 2A championship trophy in front of the scoreboard and 18th green.

Des Moines Christian's 304 team score held up in front of a hungry West Branch squad, who fired 308 for runner-up honors while being led by freshman Dylan Countryman's second-place 72. West Branch had four players shoot between 77 and 81 through 18 holes. Defending champion Kuemper Catholic, Carroll finished in third, just one stroke behind West Branch at 309.

Panorama finished fourth as a team at 321 while being led by confident medalist Kolby Shackelford. The 2018 runner-up was in control this spring,

winning by three strokes and firing an even 69 on the Legion course. His three birdies came on a pair of par-4 holes early and then the short par-3 on 18.

Behind Shackelford, 26 players shot between 70 and 80 over the 18 holes, including Kuemper senior Corbin Borelli with a fifth-place 75, and Mid-Prairie's Noah Schlabaugh and New Hampton's Ryan Anderson who tied for sixth at 76.

CLASS 1A

Harris-Lake Park posted its best ever team finish in 2018 at Newton's Westwood Golf Course, taking runner-up honors behind Grundy Center for the 1A title. The Wolves and coach Tyler Vaudt flipped the script through 18 holes and became champions this spring, firing a 322 and edging Grundy Center by three strokes to raise the trophy. The Wolves were led by sophomore Lucas Gunderson's silver-worthy 74 and ju-

nior Isaac Ihnen joining him in the top 10 at 79. Adrian Martin (82), Jaxson Heikens (87), Braydan Perkins (89), and Brody Sohn (95) rounded out the title-winning squad, which needed those low scores on an opening round that saw just 10 golfers shoot better than a nine-over 80.

Edgewood-Colesburg senior Ethan Streicher took medalist honors after shooting 72 through 18, including a pair of birdies on the back nine. The senior is Ed-Co's first state individual golf champ. He was joined by only one other senior in the medal line, as Gunderson's runner-up finish was followed by Westwood junior Sam Miller (75), Newell-Fonda sophomore Hogan Heinrich (77), and Bishop Garrigan, Algona junior Andrew Arndorfer (77) to round out the top five.

Tennis

First-time singles and doubles champs take dominant title runs

Across the four titles given out at the 2019 Class 2A and Class 1A Singles and Doubles Tennis Championships, the winners combined to drop just one set on May 24 and 25. Contested in Cedar Rapids and Waterloo, this year's competitors played indoors and outdoors to complete their postseason runs.

Rami Scheetz of Cedar Rapids, Washington added to his 2018 doubles title with an eye-opening sweep to the 2A singles crown on Saturday, never dropping more than two games in a set. Scheetz is a Connecticut tennis recruit.

On the 2A doubles championship court behind him, Waukee's Noah Burmeister and Will Ecklund completed

their own title run over the unseeded Iowa City, West duo of Sasha Chackalackal and Eli Young. Burmeister, a senior, and Ecklund, a sophomore, became Waukee's first ever state doubles champs.

Aplington-Parkersburg sophomore Cameron Luhning stole the Class 1A show in Waterloo, dropping just one game in four victories on his way to the singles title. Meanwhile, Norwalk's doubles pairing of AJ ClarkWilt and Drew Hall emerged from multiple tough tests against parochial school competition and beat Xavier, Cedar Rapids duo Wes Johnson and Matthew Schmit, 6-4 and 6-4 in the final. Like Waukee, Norwalk had not won a state doubles title until this year.

Team titles go back to West, Xavier

Iowa City, West won its ninth state tennis team title and Xavier, Cedar Rapids claimed its second title of the last three years on May 28 in Ankeny and Des Moines.

The Trojans and coach Mitch Gross were stopped short of winning a third straight championship in 2018, dropping a heart-breaking 5-4 dual with Mississippi Valley Conference rival Linn-Mar, Marion. They climbed back to the top in 2019, sweeping Ankeny Centennial on Ankeny's Prairie Ridge courts in the semifinals, then taking down Pleasant Valley, 5-1 for the title.

West started three seniors at the top of its lineup - Sam Shin, Jack Wenzel, and Sasha Chackalackal - and didn't need doubles action to pick up the trophy.

Waukee topped Ankeny Centennial in the consolation round to finish third for the third straight year. Centennial was making its first appearance in the state semifinals after narrowly beating Ames in the substate round.

Xavier had a tougher path to the title than West, going

the distance with its recent football rival Pella to pick up the 1A tennis championship. The top-seeded Saints swept through LeMars in the semifinals, then had their backs put against the wall by Pella in a 5-4 contest.

The Dutch won four out of the six singles contests, including the top two placements through junior Jordan Roozeboom and sophomore Jack Edwards. But needing just one more win in doubles competition, Pella couldn't stop Xavier from adding to its 2017 state title. Coach Jim Potts' club went 3-0 in doubles, with Brady Horstmann, Wes Johnson, Garrett Coester, and Ethan Shimak all brushing off singles losses to win with partners on the court. Sophomore Matthew Schmit and freshman Hugh Courter both won both their contests.

It was just the fifth time in Class 1A history that all nine matches were needed to determine a state champ.

Iowa City, West is now tied for second all-time with Camanche at nine team titles. They trail only Wahlert, Catholic, Dubuque with 10 team titles.

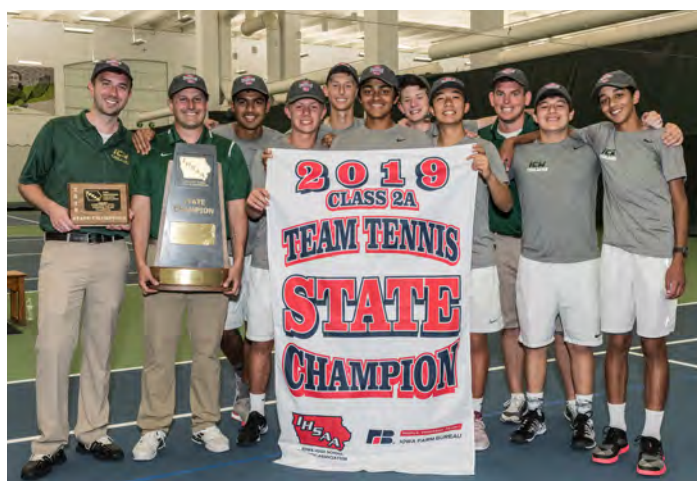

Soccer

Dominant defenses take home titles after delayed start

Serving as the final state tournament in a spring of wild weather, it was unfortunate but fitting that soccer had to wait to take the field at Cownie Soccer Park in late May. Wet conditions on grass getting ready for boys' and girls' tournament traffic forced the 2019 event to postpone one day, starting on Friday, May 31, then taking the tough semifinals to Saturday, June 1.

Once the action got into the next week, Waukee completed its perfect season, Lewis Central upset its final perennial powerhouse, and Regina, Iowa City repeated as champ yet again to wrap up a unique final Tuesday of the 2019 postseason in Des Moines.

Only two teams in the 24-team field were state tournament rookies: North Polk, Alleman and Greene County, both appearing in the Class 1A bracket.

Summaries of each class follows...

WAUKEE REPEATS WITH UNBEATEN RUN

For the second year in a row, coach Carlos Acebey's Waukee squad took home the Class 3A championship in style, completing a 22-0 season and allowing just one goal in its entire postseason run.

The Warriors won both opening weekend games 3-0 at Cownie against Cedar Rapids, Kennedy and Bettendorf. Rested for Tuesday's final, they rolled through nine-time champ Iowa City, West for a 3-1 win that included a fourth-minute tap-in, a fantastic free kick from Edi Cokovic in the 24th minute, and a penalty kick to cap it off from captain Justin Cramer in the 56th.

West (18-2) grabbed a goal back through Micah Frisbie in the 62nd, but the first goal allowed by Waukee in the fifth game of its 2019 playoffs was not enough to spark an epic comeback.

Waukee was the first team to finish a full season unbeaten in any class since Beckman Catholic, Dyersville accomplished the feat in 1A back in 2016. Iowa City, West finished as state runner-up for the fourth time.



Class 1A produced the biggest scorelines of the week, starting with 23 combined goals in Friday's quarterfinals.

Cedar Rapids, Washington finished

third in 3A after topping Marshalltown and its gigantic crowd in the quarterfinals, then dropping a semifinal to MVC rival Iowa City, West, then beating Bettendorf, 3-0 in the consolation round.

Marshalltown spent the longest time away from the tournament of any 3A qualifier, getting to state for the first time since 2001 after edging out Southeast Polk in a hotly-contested substate final.

LEWIS CENTRAL TAKES FIRST TITLE

Lewis Central survived a tense penalty shootout with tournament regular Storm Lake to start its first state appearance since 1997, then held off Hudson United in a 1-0 semifinal and duplicated that scoreline against seven-time champ Xavier, Cedar Rapids to claim its first 2A state soccer title.

The Titans were guided by a tenacious defense that didn't allow a goal over the last 200-plus minutes they played at Cownie. Goals from Luis Espino and Jacob Lin were all they needed to get an advantage over Hudson and Xavier, leading to a field-storm from their boisterous crowd at the final whistle on Tuesday. Storm Lake almost prevented Lewis Central from reaching that point, holding a 2-1 lead and nearly extending that to 3-1 with a penalty kick in the quarterfinals. Once the spot kick was ruled out, the Titans drew level through Connor Lancial in the 70th minute and eventually won in the shootout, 4-2, after goalkeeper Cole Jensen's impressive saves.

Xavier's Andrija Mijatovic tied a state tourney record with four goals in the quarterfinal win over Knoxville. Hudson tied its best tournament finish with a third-place showing after a 3-0 consolation victory over Gilbert. Gilbert was appearing in the 2A field just one season after finishing third in the Class 1A tournament.

Soccer

REGINA REPEATS IN TOUGH 1A ROAD

The third match of the season between Regina, Iowa City and Columbus Catholic, Waterloo was for the Class 1A championship and the Regals held on 1-0 to take their third straight crown and the rubber match. The Regals had to wait for Jonah Warren's winner in the 73rd minute to take the advantage and secure their eighth state title.

Class 1A had goals galore waiting after the delayed start

to the tournament, including 23 across the four quarterfinal matches. Saturday's semifinals were more tense with five of the round's six goals scored after halftime.

Sioux Center finished third in just its second state tourney appearance. Despite having just 10 men on the field for most of the consolation matchup, the Warriors scored in double overtime to edge West Liberty, 2-1. Columbus Catholic's Saw Win Lin scored four times on Friday to tie a tourney record.

In memoriam

Remembering the lives of those who served the IHSAA and its member schools

STEVEN L. ALLSPACH, Sioux City: Mr. Allspach, a well known sports writer, passed away May 15 after suffering a stroke earlier this winter. He was 74. Born in Newton, he grew up and attended school in Baxter. He was a four-sport athlete and graduated in 1962. He attended Wartburg College in Waverly before joining the United States Army. He served in the Army for two years, including 13 months in Germany until his honorable discharge. He returned to Iowa and attended William Penn University in Oskaloosa, graduating in 1971 with a BA degree.

Steve started his sports writing career in 1972 with the Oskaloosa Herald and then with the Cedar Rapids Gazette and Centerville lowegian. On Jan. 1, 1981, he began his long-time career with the Sioux City Journal and was most recently working on a semi-retired basis. Over the years, he received many prestigious journalism awards with one being the IHSAA Outstanding Media Award. He served on the all-state selection committees of various sports and his columns enjoyed wide readership in the Siouxland area. He enjoyed attending Sunnybrook Community Church in Sioux City. He is survived by his significant other, Sammy Butcher of Sioux City; two daughters and their families, Liz (Nino) Geraci and their daughter, Leah, of Watertown, Mass., and Amy (Shawn) Silva and their children, Nick and Lauren of Provincetown, Mass.; two brothers, Stan (Sharon) Allspach and Stuart Allspach, all of Baxter; one nephew, Aaron (Jessica) Allspach of Des Moines; one niece, Angie (Chad) Pietig of Marshalltown; and five great-nieces and nephews.

BILLY COLDIRON, West Des Moines: An outstanding and affable educator and coach, Mr. Coldiron passed away on April 14 at Unity Point Hospice Taylor House. He was 87. He was born in Iowa City, but the family moved to Des Moines early in his life. He starred in football and graduated from East High School in 1950 and accepted a football scholarship from Drake University. Bill received his undergraduate and master's degree from Drake University in Health and Physical Education. He taught physical education and coached at Valley for 40 years. He coached a variety of sports, but boys and girls golf were his main emphasis and joy.

During his tenure as golf coach, his teams won a total of 14 state championships, including the grand slam in 1976 winning the boys, girls, and co-ed championships. He also served as activities director at Valley. His enthusiasm for all school activities was contagious and when he retired in 1995, the field house at Valley High School was renamed the Bill J. Coldiron Field House. He received numerous other awards in education and coaching.

In 1994, he was named NHSACA National Golf Coach of the year. In 2004, he was inducted into the Golf Coaches Hall of Fame, and in 2005 he was inducted into the National High

School Athletic Coaches Association Hall of Fame. In 2007, Bill was honored to receive to Double D award from Drake University and to be inducted into the East High School Athletic Hall of fame in 2009. He is survived by his wife Judy and daughter, Connie (Kevin) Johnson of Adel; granddaughter Sarah (Kerry) Fineran of Ankeny and two great grandchildren plus his sister Marlys (Phil) Hamilton of Des Moines, two nieces, a nephew, three great nieces and two great nephews.

GEORGE LEWIS FUNK, Marshalltown: Mr. Funk, an iconic high school educator and coach passed away June 6 at Briarwood Health Care Center in Iowa City. He was 85. He was born and raised in Peoria, IL graduating in 1952 from Manual High School. He starred in football, baseball, and basketball and earned a scholarship to play basketball at Drake University where he was named to the University's All Decade Team in 1966. While at Drake, George was also a member of the Air Force ROTC and following graduation he served in the Air Force as a radar technician.

He started his journey in education at Ida Grove and Knoxville before going to Marshalltown, where he was the boys' basketball coach for 26 years. He guided 10 teams (all at Marshalltown) to the state tournament, winning the 1966 state championship and finishing second in 1972 and 1976. He retired from coaching in 1989 but retained his position as athletic director until his retirement in 1998. His 31-year record was 436-237. In addition, he was inducted into the IHSAA Basketball Hall of Fame and the Iowa High School Athletic Directors Hall of Fame.

He is survived by his wife of 64 years, Phyllis; three children: Diane (Earl) Gingerich of Iowa City, Lori (Steve) Mitts of Olathe, KS, and Mark of Minneapolis, MN; plus seven grandchildren: and his brother, Robert of Charleston, IL.

JIM GEBHART, Des Moines: A highly respected educator and baseball coach, Mr. Gebhart died May 23 at the age of 74. He was born in Boca Raton, FL, and later moved Dyersville, where he grew up. He graduated from Xavier High School, where he was an all-around athlete but favored baseball. He received his BS degree from the University of Northern Iowa, and his MS Degree in Education from Iowa State University. His career in education spanned four decades included teaching, coaching and being an athletic director all at Saydel High School, where he remained loyal until his retirement and beyond.

Jim was renowned throughout the state for his accomplishments. He had a career that included 526 victories and was inducted into the Iowa Baseball Coaches Association Hall of Fame in 2000. He was named the Iowa High School Athletic Directors Association (IHSADA) Athletic Director

of the Year in 2003. He also received the distinguished Bob White Award in 2016. The Bob White Award is given to a leader who exemplifies qualities of character and leadership.

However, Jim's greatest joy and most significant achievements were realized from his family life. He loved his sisters, children, grandchildren, nieces and nephews. Those left to cherish the many great memories are his sons, James R. (April) Gebhart and Steven Gebhart; twin sister, Jan Cleator; sisters, Jeanie (Dan) Krcmar and Judy Gronemeyer; and his adored grandchildren, Cal, Jace, and Macie.

WALTER LAFOLLETTE, Fort Dodge: A long time educator and fixture at Fort Dodge wrestling meets, Mr. LaFollette passed away on May 10. Walter was born May 6, 1922, in Russell and later he graduated from Simpson College. He served in the United States Naval Reserve and following his discharge he was united in marriage to Barbara Stevens in Des Moines. The couple moved their family to Fort Dodge in 1957. He taught physical education in Fort Dodge for 27 years. He coached wrestling, pole vaulting and some football.

He was also the athletic director for North Junior High. He enjoyed all different kind of sports, was an active swimmer, fitness training, and ran many 10K races well into his 70s. Coach was active in local service organizations and would volunteered at Friendship Haven and the YMCA youth programs. After retirement, he and Barb enjoyed travelling in Europe. They would also spend their winter months at the Southwest Gulf Shores of Alabama. Barbara passed away in 2012. He is survived by his two sons, Gary LaFollette of Fort Dodge and Dennis LaFollette of Ely, MN and his granddaughter, Andria LaFollette.

KENNETH LEE SHAW, 84, Nevada: Mr. Shaw passed away June 15 at MercyOne in Des Moines. He was born May 15, 1935, in Redding and graduated from Lone Tree High School in 1953. He obtained his bachelor's degree at Iowa

Wesleyan College and earned his master's degree at the University of Iowa and later his Superintendent Certification. He served in the United States Army, including the Army Reserve for many years, before embarking on a lifetime career in public education.

After serving in multiple schools as a teacher, principal, and superintendent, he spent the last 23 years of his career as the superintendent of the Nevada Community School District, before retiring in 1997. He was active in community organizations and his church. He also served on the Representative Council of the Iowa High School Athletic Association, earning their coveted Administrators' Award for supporting education activities and athletics in their school. He was also a president of AEA 11 Superintendents.

Ken is survived by his wife, Carolyn of 63 years; his children: Mike (Vicki) Shaw of Davenport, Mark (Tina) Shaw of Grinnell and Julie Shaw of Phoenix, AZ; his sisters: Ann (Don) Stahly of Iowa City and Donna (John) Reichardt of Solon; plus eight grandchildren and eight great-grandchildren.
