Eight voting members and one non-voting member comprise the Board of Control. Amanda Whaley is a voting member and represents the Iowa Association of School Boards. She is appointed by that group. Dr. Ryan Wise is a representative of the State Department of Education, a non-voting member. The remaining seven members are elected by IHSAA member schools. All five IHSAA Representative Council districts in the state are represented on the Board. The Board of Control has general supervision over all athletic contests of Association schools, and interprets Association rules. A 25-member Representative Council formulates the aims and policies of the Association for the ensuing year and has the power to initiate amendments and new rules for the Executive Director to submit to the electorate. The Council members are also elected by IHSAA member schools and are chosen by districts and according to school classification. Each of the five districts have the five council members and four of the five represent class A schools with one representing class AA schools in that district.

IHSAA Online Offerings

The 2018-19 school year saw the expansion of online information under both the general IHSAA website and the usage of QuikStats.

The IHSAA has continued to develop its online tools and fulfillment requirements with regard to rules meetings and membership voting procedures.

In addition, social media has become an important part of IHSAA communication efforts with more than 30,000 followers on Twitter. The IHSAA regularly disseminates information through its social media channels.





IHSAA Mission & Promotion of Education-Based Activities

The IHSAA continued its campaign promoting the value of education-based activities titled, "More Than a Game," which included materials being distributed online and in traditional print publications. In addition, social media saw thousands of people across the state engage with the materials.

In addition, the IHSAA utilizes a campaign from the NFHS to promote student involvement through the "My Reason Why" campaign.



Governor's Scholar Recognition Program

The 2018-19 school year marked the 16th anniversary of the Governor's Scholar Recognition Program. This program is a joint effort between the Athletic Association, its title sponsor lowa Farm Bureau and the Governor's Office. The students who were recognized were greeted by Governor Reynolds and Lt. Governor Gregg as they crossed the stage. The students were honored for academic achievements during their high school careers. A ceremony and reception were held for the students on April 28, 2019. More than 3200 students and guests attended.





IHSAA Publications

The IHSAA communicates with its membership, the media and the public in many ways, including varied print pieces throughout the year. The IHSAA Bulletin publishes four times per year. In addition, the IHSAA maintains and prints a Directory for member high schools.

Other significant publications include State Tournament Programs and seasonal rule manuals. The IHSAA Handbook is also compiled and published on an annual basis.

The IHSAA serves as the print facility for the Iowa High School Music Association, the Iowa Cheerleading Coaches' Association, the Iowa Association of Student Councils and the Iowa Hall of Pride.

Officials Registering in Iowa

A function of the Iowa High School Athletic Association is the registration of contest officials for interscholastic competition. In addition, member schools of the Association are required to use only such registered officials. The IHSAA registered and oversaw more than 4,408 officials across the state in 2018-2019. These officials cover all IHSAA sanctioned sports and are a key component to the success of educational athletics in Iowa.

An official's registration fee includes NFOA membership with General Liability and Excess Accident Medical insurance as well.

The IHSAA provides a rule book every two years in each sport an official is registered, annual rules meetings and exams; clinics; online newsletters during each sports season containing points of information, interpretation, policies, and procedures; IHSAA wall calendar; school directory if desired; and the opportunity to attend the Annual Officials Awards & Recognition Banquet for 15, 25, 35 & 50-year officials.



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IHSAA Educational Outreach

The Iowa High School Athletic Association is the sponsoring organization for the Iowa Association of Student Councils (IASC). The IHSAA and IASC host the annual Iowa Student Leadership Conference in Des Moines. The conference saw more than 1,600 student leaders and student council advisors attend.

Along with the statewide leadership conference, the IHSAA also assists student council groups with both student and advisor training and development throughout the year. The goal of the IHSAA and IASC partnership is straightforward - provide tools for students to become stronger leaders.

The IHSAA also works closely with the UNI Center for Violence Prevention to facilitate workshops and programs dealing with gender violence issues in schools and communities.

The Pride Academy is another educational initiative of the Iowa Hall of Pride & IHSAA that helps students develop goal setting, decision making, and/or human relations skills to become successful in their next step in life.

The initiative grew out of the Jacobson Education Fund at the Hall of Pride, and it is meant to be a resource for schools and groups to look at issues including: leadership, sportsmanship/school pride and communication.



Awards & Recognitions

At its tournament events and special meetings, the IHSAA recognized and honored dozens of school administrators with awards for exemplary school programs as well as Bernie Saggau Award winners; hall of fame players, coaches and officials. Other award recipients included members of the media; friend of the school award and public address announcers.

In addition, the IHSAA annually recognizes students participating at state tournaments with photo plaques and autograph sport balls with the assistance of its title sponsor lowa Farm Bureau.

Many member schools also nominate and receive academic achievement awards for qualifying teams.

Chad Elsberry, Assistant Director – member of the NFHS Education Committee; and former member of the NFHS Annual Meeting Advisory Committee.




Iowa Hall of Pride
